A student had fun dancing with a Dearborn Rotarian at recent Dearborn School Foundation Mardi Gras party. Club member and guest have connections to Comedy Central and music gigs in Las Vegas. One club member will be traveling, soon. Student was happy for outstanding review Dearborn High received. Another student thanked Dearborn Rotary for sponsoring Youth Month. It's Charity Week at Edsel Ford and they are raising funds for Doctor's Without Borders. Divine Child students raised \$50,000. for Capuchin Soup Kitchen. Student is happy for upcoming winter break. Teacher is happy to work in education and for Youth Month. Hope we come together and there are no more tragedies. Today's a good day.

Today's speaker, Donald R. Guinn, a speaker with Michigan Attorney General Consumer Protection Division, was introduced by David Anderson. His student safety presentation is "OK2SAY".

Internet is okay to use, depending on how it is used. Michigan Attorney General Bill Schuette established program because of concerns regarding use of the internet.

We heard about bullying and October is Anti-Bullying Month. Bullying can lead to suicide, self-injury, sex-ting, drugs/alcohol, threats, dating violence and sexual assault. Sex-ting is sending suggestive material to other people. These are real things. We have a six-grader involved in dating violence by beating a girl. Cyber-bullying can follow you wherever you go, even on the weekend. Twitter, Snap Chat, Blue Whale, etc. can all be used for cyber-bullying.

You leave a digital footprint wherever you go and there are consequences. Admission's officer at a college has four candidates for one spot. They will review your social media footprint to see who you are, to determine who gets the last spot.

Sex-ting is out of control. Junior high students are involved. Resending naked pictures of minors can get you arrested for distributing child pornography. This has happened when one student is 18 and the other is 16. If you are sex-ting, it is part of your digital footprint. It will be on the internet for all time.

OK2SAY is a fantastic program. There is hotline and an app for it. They have fielded 9,000 contacts over several years. Contact the program and someone will respond to help you. They have talked a suicidal girl down from a bridge.

There are internet predators out there. Young, old, male, and female and they are conning young people. Too many young people are hurt by strangers, who build relationships with them. Michigan Attorney General Office is going after internet predators.

Diane Ives, Maysam Alie Bazzi, President Bob, students and Bob Selwa are had questions or comments. If you receive sex-ting images, do not save or resend. There are great educational videos on OK2SAY website. Several other states have similar programs, but ours is the best. Students, work hard and tell fellow students about consequences of social media. Do not be afraid to speak-up. Any information you share with OK2SAY program is confidential. Attorney General Office has OK2SAY programs for students from kindergarten to 12<sup>th</sup> grade. Their office also does consumer protection talks, such as identity theft, to Rotary Clubs and other civic organizations. Peer pressure can be great. It can build you up, or tear you down. OK2SAY hotline has resources across the state that can help someone threatening suicide.

President Bob thanked Donald Guinn for his presentation and invited him to sign a book plate for a children's book to be donated to Dearborn Public library. Mr. Guinn was given a Dearborn Rotary signing pen. Students were invited to next week's meeting, even though they are on Winter Break. In two weeks, the students run the meeting. Dearborn Rotary Club meeting ended with us reciting the Four-Way Test in unison.

## Rotaract



Rotaract originally began as a Rotary International youth program in 1968 at Charlotte North Rotary Club in Charlotte, North Carolina, USA, and has grown into a major Rotary-sponsored organization of over 5820 clubs spread around the world and 133,000 members. It is a service, leadership and community service organization for young men and women between the ages 18–30. Rotaract focuses on the development of young adults as leaders in their communities and workplaces. Clubs around the world also take part in international service projects, in a global effort to bring peace and international understanding to the world. Rotaract provides an opportunity for young men and women to enhance the knowledge and skills that will assist them in personal development, to address the physical and social needs of their communities, and to promote better relations between all people worldwide through a framework of friendship and service.

“Rotaract” stands for “Rotary in Action.” Most Rotaract activities take place at the club level. Rotaract clubs hold formal meetings, usually every two weeks, which feature speakers, special project work, social events, or professional/leadership development workshops.

## RYLA



Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is a leadership program coordinated by Rotary clubs and Districts across the globe. Each year thousands of young people participate in this program. Young people ages 14–30 are sponsored by Rotary clubs to attend the event run by the club’s district committee. Participants are chosen for their leadership potential. Rotary clubs and the Rotary district cover all expenses for the participants. The format of the event varies from district to district, but commonly takes the form of a seminar, camp, or workshop to discuss leadership skills and to learn those skills through practice. Rotary clubs and districts select participants and facilitate the event’s curriculum.

### RYLA aims to:

- Demonstrate Rotary’s respect and concern for youth
- Provide an effective training experience for selected youth and potential leaders
- Encourage leadership of youth by youth
- Publicly recognize young people who are rendering service to their communities

### Every RYLA program covers the following core topics:

- Fundamentals of leadership
- Ethics of positive leadership
- Importance of communication skills in effective leadership
- Problem-solving and conflict management
- Rotary’s purpose and service to the community
- Building self-confidence and self-esteem
- Elements of community and global citizenship

District 6400 (our District) holds their RYLA in November of each year.
