## Meeting Notes

Club President Eric Rader led today's meeting, which opened with the singing of the National Anthem. Invocation was done by Bob Gleichauf and he thanked everyone for their support of Santa Snaps and was thankful it was done for the year. He hoped for a good new year. Today's greeter, Martha Hnatiuk, introduced our two guests: Jan Kornacki (today's speaker) and Kamil Alameddine (guest of Margaret Blohm).

President Eric thanked everyone who worked on Santa Snaps and said entire set is now put away and carpet is dry. We had lot of volunteers for Santa Snaps nightly staffing this year and most evenings ran smoothly. Rick Goward, Angie Linder and their crew worked admirably one evening when we were short-staffed.

February is Youth Month and we will have guest students from local high schools each week at Rotary.

Sarah Al-Tamimi led 50/50 drawing today. President Eric drew winning ticket and guest, Kamil Alameddine, was the winner. He promptly donated his winnings to the Club.

Shannon Peterson, Glenn Maleyko, Sarah Al-Tamimi and Bob Gleichauf all had "Happy Bucks" announcements. Recognizing today is National Law Enforcement Day. Thank you Bob Gleichauf for all your hard work leading Santa Snaps. Appreciate all our Santa Snaps volunteers and happy it is done. Happy I am an assistant coach on my son's hockey team and impressed with my motivated son. Had a great time with family on a cruise over the holidays. Going on my first vacation with my fiancée.

Today's speaker, Jan Kornacki, MA, LLP, Executive Director of Dearborn Pastoral Counseling Center, was introduced by President Eric. Dearborn Pastoral Counseling Center began in 1984 when five local pastors determined there was a need for local mental health counseling. Clients had a greater counseling need than could be provided by the pastors. First Presbyterian, Cherry Hill Presbyterian, Hope Lutheran, Cherry Hill Baptist and Christ Episcopal were the churches that started the counseling center.

Dearborn Pastoral Counseling Center serves 800 to 900 clients per year and has four license therapists, including one psychiatrist. They are faith-based, but also serve non-faith clients. No one is turned away. They have a client aid fund that helps cover the cost of services for clients without insurance. A client receiving aid funds is required to pay something toward counseling and is based on their income. Some only pay \$12. or \$5. They accept seventeen different types of insurance. Deductibles have become so high on insurance, some clients have trouble paying for counseling.

Flyers were on our tables about Dearborn Pastoral Counseling Center. One was a fundraising flyer for Dearborn Pastoral Counseling Center sponsored by English Gardens. It was "Flower of the Month Club Fundraiser". For one-time payment of \$35., you can pick-up a specified monthly seasonal bouquet or plant at an English Gardens location. Dearborn Pastoral Counseling Center receives a percentage of the sales.

Dearborn Pastoral Counseling Center has a fundraising goal of \$50,000. this year. They need to update their computer systems to accommodate electronic billing by insurance companies and electronic record keeping. Would also like to update their office furniture. Organization survives on donations and networks with local pastors and community groups. Their executive directors are pastors and social workers. Speaker Jan Kornacki said she was involved with campus ministry for 17 years, clinical social work for 20 years, and now as an executive director, marketing and fundraising. Their office is located at Cherry Hill Presbyterian Church, located at Cherry Hill and Telegraph Roads. She invited us to visit their offices or refer someone there for services.

Bob Gleichauf, President Eric and David Anderson had questions or comments. Organization went two years without an executive director. Look at spirituality and mental health. There is a huge stigma about being depressed. They had a seminar a UM-D about depression and anxiety. Some of their clients want religion in their help, while others are non-practicing. See all ages of clients. One therapist specializes in younger children. Psychiatrist on staff visits once a month. Demographics of clients are all over the place. They come from Dearborn and surrounding area. Not aware of a similar service in local Muslim community.

President Eric thanked Jan Kornacki for her presentation and invited her to sign a children's book to be donated to Dearborn Public Library.

Wendy Sample, daughter of former Dearborn Rotarian David Sample (deceased), dropped off half a dozen Rotary Ann pins before the meeting. Lee Hollmann shared Rotary Anns were an organization of spouses prior to women being permitted in Rotary. They met in each other's homes for lunches and did some fundraising and service projects. PPRI, PDG, PP Dearborn Rotarian Hugh Archer was a major proponent of permitting women in Rotary. Rotary Anns diminished and eventually disappeared after acceptance of women in Rotary around 1987-89. For a modest donation (Dearborn Rotary fundraiser), you can purchase a Rotary Ann pin, a piece of Rotary history.

Dearborn Rotary Club meeting closed with us reciting the Four-Way Test in unison.

## January is Vocational Service Month in Rotary International

### WHAT IS VOCATIONAL SERVICE?

Vocational Service calls every Rotarian to:

- *Aspire to high ethical standards in their occupation;*
- *Recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations, and;*
- *Contribute their vocational talents to the problems and needs of society.*


Rotarians, clubs, and districts should implement the following strategies in their support of Vocational Service:

- *Strengthen the emphasis on vocation and classification in new member recruitment and induction.*
- *Identify means of emphasizing vocation in club activities.*
- *Create a stronger emphasis on business networking with integrity in Rotary at the club and district level.*
- *Focus more attention on business networking with integrity as a means of attracting and mentoring the new generation.*
- *Emphasize the connection between the Four Way Test and the Rotary Code of Conduct (formerly called: Declaration of Rotarians in Business and Professions) and their importance to the values of Rotary.*

When professionals join a Rotary club, they do so as a representative of their classification – their particular business or profession.

Rotarians have the dual responsibility of representing their vocation within the club and exemplifying the ideals of Rotary within the workplace.

One of the central goals of Vocational Service is to promote and advance Rotary's high ethical standards. Two useful tools Rotarians have to assess these standards are **The Four-Way Test** and **The Rotary Code of Conduct**.



## ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT

As a Rotarian, I will:

1. Act with integrity and high ethical standards in my personal and professional life
2. Deal fairly with others and treat them and their occupations with respect
3. Use my professional skills through Rotary to mentor young people, help those with special needs, and improve people's quality of life in my community and in the world
4. Avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians
5. Help maintain a harassment-free environment in Rotary meetings, events, and activities; report any suspected harassment; and help ensure non-retaliation to those individuals that report harassment
