Rick Goward presented a check for \$5,450. to the Club from Henry Ford College Big Band Bop & Pop Concert fundraiser. He thanked all Rotarians who supported the concert and invited some big supporters up for a photograph.

50/50 raffle was led by Neil Allen today. PE Eric drew winning ticket and Ray Trudeau was winner of \$10.

Bob Gleichauf, PE Eric, Rick Goward and Ray Trudeau all had Happy Buck announcements. Koi in fish pond survived. Happy President Glenn is being recognized today in Lansing. We got through Polar Vortex. House is flooded, but we are doing okay.

Nick Leonard, today's speaker, was introduced by Sara Gleicher. He is Executive Director of Great Lake Environmental Center and an attorney. Healthy Dearborn has been involved with his organization due to poor air quality in Southeast Dearborn/Salina. Nick has worked as an attorney for City of Detroit, an Equal Rights Justice Fellow, plus been involved in real estate transactions for Urban Agriculture. He grew-up on east side of Detroit and is a graduate of U of D Jesuit High School, Kalamazoo College and U of M Law School.

Great Lakes Environmental Center is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization located in Midtown Detroit. They provide affordable and pro-bono high quality legal services regarding environmental issues in neighborhoods. Past weekend release event at Marathon Petroleum refinery is an example of air quality and how it affects surrounding residents. Center looks at both air and water pollution. They care because air and water pollution can have serious health impacts on people.

Air pollution is any substance which might cause people harm. It can be particulate (dust) or gas. Some is man-made and some is from nature (such as wild fires). Dearborn and surrounding communities of Detroit, River Rouge, Ecorse and Melvindale have air quality problems because of clustering or concentration of pollution from AK Steel, Ford, Marathon, Edward C. Levy Co., etc. Polluters are regulated by Federal, Michigan and some local laws. There are air pollution monitoring stations, but their monitoring capabilities are limited due to vast variety of pollutants. Challenge of Nick's job is obtaining quality data regarding air contaminants. Need more air quality monitoring stations plus continuous coverage. Some government emission tests are only required once every three years. There is an air quality monitoring station near Salina School which monitors six types of emissions.

Ambient air quality standards in southern Wayne County and southwest Detroit are not meeting current standards set by the EPA. MDEQ can bring enforcement actions. There are limitations to Federal Air quality regulations. Local communities can regulate some polluters, such as City of Detroit did with petroleum coke piles and their dust issue.

PP Bob Gleichauf thanked Nick Leonard from Great Lakes Environmental Law Center for his presentation and invited him to sign a children's book to be donated to Dearborn Public Library. Dearborn Rotary Club meeting closed with us reciting the Four-Way Test in unison.
