Reggie Simmons (DHS) handed us our Rotary badges. Zoe Rogula (EFHS) and Syed Akbari (EFHS) sold us 50/50 tickets. Adam Bazzi (DHS) led today's meeting and we opened with the singing of the National Anthem. We had a two-part Invocation and first part was done in Arabic by Gadi Bzeih (EFHS) and second in English by Isaiah Goddard (DHS). We heard a prayer of thanks and God Bless the USA. Syed Akbari (EFHS) introduced our five guests - Danene Charles, Violet Souweidane, Norma Harb and Darryl Warner from Dearborn Public Schools plus Jim Karolyi from Taylor Rotary Club. There was no serenading, today.

Zoe Rogula (EFHS) brought up the 50/50 raffle bowl for the drawing. Jim Ives was winner of \$21., which he donated to Rotary Foundation.

Travis Furlow, Shannon Peterson, Glenn Maleyko, Jim Ives, Kathy Gapa, Maysam Alie-Bazzi, Darryl Warner, and students all made "Happy Buck" announcements. Martha Hnatiuk's granddaughter will be a Rotary Exchange Student this next school year and is waiting to be placed.

Students made presentations about activities at their respective high schools. Syed Akbari (EFHS) provided technical support by running PowerPoint program. Caleb Kelly and Alexandria Grenn from Divine Child talked about their school's "Faith in Action" program. Each student pledges to raise money to support charitable organizations. Recently their school raised \$53,000. to support Capuchin Soup Kitchen. Last they raised \$52,000. for St. Vincent DePaul. They also do service days at Vista Maria, Cass Community Center, Dearborn Animal Shelter, etc. for their Faith in Action program.

Isaiah Goddard, Rachel Williams, Reggie Simmons and Adam Bazzi from Dearborn High School presented about "Battle Against Hunger". They competed against other high schools in collecting food for the needy. DHS might have loss competition is quantity of food cans raised (26,000 cans), but beat EFHS, based on a better can to student ratio.

Maria Mazariegos-Gonzales from Advanced Technology Academy presented about their early college program. They earn a high school diploma and associates degree in their 13th year. She is in a medical field of study, but engineering, business and education are other tracks of study. Optimist's Club is involved at their school.

Ali Srour, Ali Hammoud, Marwa Khalil, and Ali A. Hammoud from Fordson High School shared they raised 75,000 cans of food for "Battle Against Hunger". They did well because they involved their feeder schools in the program, too. Also took monetary contributions. They had a 69% participation rate. Fordson also does fundraising through "Color Outs for Awareness" such as blue for bullying, red for heart health, and pink for breast cancer. Students wear appropriate colors for these events. They also fund raise through a basketball game, the Ali Hachem scholarship, in honor of a former student who passed away from heart failure. Fordson students are proud of architecture of their school – which led to a little trash talking from DHS, "we get it, you have a nice school".

Shahab Abdullah, Zoe Rogula, Gadi Bzeih and Syed Akbari (technical support) presented about Edsel Ford High School. We heard about second annual "Charity Week" and how students are raising funds for "Doctors Without Borders" and "United Muslim Relief". Miss Haddad helped organize the week and it was high energy, students had fun and everyone was happy. A lively video, "This is Our Journey", and set to music, was shown of "Charity Week". Video was assembled from filming from multiple student camera phones. It showed fundraising events including bowling, coffee donation, restaurant donation, a Dabke Dance, bake sale, passport and yoga events, basketball game, pancake breakfast, raffle, etc. Students raised just over \$20,000. for the week.

All the students gathered at front of room for a group photograph, including Makayla Henry from MBCC. Dearborn Public Schools staff joined them, too. They thanked Dearborn Rotary for Youth Month plus support from Dr. Maleyko and Dearborn Schools for attending. Students enjoyed the lunches, programs and getting out of school. Neil Allen said this is an exceptional group of young people. Students were invited to sign a bookplate for a children's book to be donated to Dearborn Public Library. Each student was given a gift card for participating in Youth Month.

Shannon Peterson introduced TrucHan Nguyen, a Dearborn Public Schools student, who attended Rotary District 6400 RYLA program last fall. Vivian said Rotary Youth Leadership Awards was an amazing event, she made many friends, learned leadership skills, and it helped her grow. She thanked Dearborn Rotary for sending her to RYLA.

Dearborn Rotary Club meeting ended by Reggie Simmons (DHS) leading us in reciting the Four-Way Test in unison.

Rotary Peace Programs

A special program of The Rotary Foundation was originally labelled the "Rotary Peace Forum." The concept of a center or educational program to promote greater understanding and peace in the world was originally discussed in 1982 by the New Horizons Committee and the World Understanding and Peace Committee. In 1984 it was further explored by a New Programs Committee of The Rotary Foundation. The essence of the Rotary Peace Program is to utilize the non-governmental but worldwide resources of Rotary to develop educational programs around the issues that cause conflict among nations in the world as well as those influences and activities that promote peace, development and goodwill. The program includes seminars, publications or conferences as a means to initiate a global dialogue to find new approaches to peace and world understanding. Specific Rotary Peace Programs are selected twice a year by the Trustees of The Rotary Foundation. Many peace programs are held each year in conjunction with presidential conferences.
