Congratulations Bob Ziolkowski being named Dearborn Service Member of the Year by Inter-Service Club Council of Dearborn!

Henry Ford College Choir will perform holiday music at our December 12, 2019, Thursday luncheon meeting. Dearborn Rotary Board cancelled Rotary meetings on November 28 (Thanksgiving), December 26, January 2, and January 23 (Big Band Concert is 1-25).

Bob Gleichauf was presented an upgraded Paul Harris Fellow pin by Jim Thorpe for Bob's continued support of the Rotary International Foundation. Jim encouraged us to keep sending in donations to support RI Foundation – "Every Rotarian, Every Year".

Jim Perri from Fairlane Sunrise Rotary Club encouraged us to volunteer at Starfish Winter Coat Distribution in Inkster this Monday and in Plymouth this Tuesday. We will be fitting children with winter coats purchased via donations from Fairlane Sunrise, Dearborn Rotary Foundation and a Rotary District Grant. 247 coats will be distributed.

Martha Hnatiuk led 50/50 drawing today with an assist by Lee Hollmann. President Eric drew winning ticket and Darlene Schoolmaster won \$15.

Darlene Schoolmaster, Bob Ziolkowski, Danene Charles, and President Eric all had "Happy Bucks" announcements. Multiple happy Bob Ziolkowski was named "Service Person of the Year". Happy for two half-day snow days. Thank you Dearborn Rotary for supporting service to community. Thank you Margaret Blohm and David Anderson for promoting me at Inter-Service Club Council of Dearborn luncheon. Happy for students and past "Happy Buck" announcement for a snow day was prophetic.

Today's program was about "Hope Against Trafficking" and was presented by Janna Snyder. She has a business background and her organization works to help individuals recover from human trafficking, which is a form of modern day slavery. We watched a video about how trafficked individuals can be as young as 12, 14 and 16 years old and it takes place in all communities, even places like Grand Rapids and Mackinaw Island. Michigan has an attractive climate for trafficking because of freeways, border, airport, waterways, auto show, sporting events, etc. 1,200 women are being trafficked in Detroit. Digital devices and social media are the greatest risk for our children becoming involved in trafficking. Devices allow strangers into your home. Children with a life-changing event are most vulnerable. A family or boyfriend break-up can make children vulnerable to trafficking. Kids can be described as "cars without brakes" because their brains are not fully developed until age 25. They have problems with impulse control and are wired for addiction. Traffickers become their friend, spend money on them, separate them from support structures, introduce them to drugs and alcohol, reduce their self-esteem, and then coerce into sex trafficking/slavery. Young girls can produce \$180,000. per year in revenue. Stay involved in your children's lives, eat dinner together.

Hope Against Trafficking is working with women, who have been involved with human trafficking long-term. They have a two year program where a group of women live in a home and they receive physical, medical and counseling care. They are serving 16 women and have a waiting list of 125. Hope Against Trafficking is looking for financial support and volunteers who can help remodel these group homes.

Bob Gleichauf and Angie Linder had questions. Hope Against Trafficking owns three homes in a Pontiac neighborhood. One is presently in use in their program and a second is about to open. Third needs remodeling for a group home use – needs more plumbing. Also own three nearby vacant lots. A nearby former elementary school is becoming a community center. Kirk In The Hills supports their program. Thistle Farms in Nashville, a successful rehab program for trafficking victims, is the model for Hope Against Trafficking.

President Eric thanked Janna Snyder from Hope Against Trafficking for her presentation and invited her to sign a children's book to be donated to Dearborn Public Library. Dearborn Rotary Club meeting closed with us reciting the Four-Way Test in unison.

## Past Member Ginger Nickloy-Coxeter Passes



Past Dearborn Rotary Member Ginger Nickloy-Coxeter passed away November 12th. Ginger was a special person with Dearborn Rotary, being very engaged as a member while she was here. Ginger was one of the first group of women to join Dearborn Rotary after Rotary International opened its membership to women in the late 80's. She entered with great women Rotarians as Bea McCray, Alberta Muirhead, Marge Powell, and Roberta Katona in 1988.

Ginger was employed at the time by Ford Motor Land Development, and helped us with many initiatives with the help of Ford Motor Land Development. She was also an integral member of the "Good Company" TV show production team. Good Company was a TV show Dearborn Rotary produced for 20 years as a community access show that talked about all things Dearborn and Rotary. She was a tireless crew member on that team. Upon retirement from Ford, Ginger moved her membership in Rotary to Walled Lake where she lived. She continued on with her Rotary service in Walled Lake, and help many lives in her efforts.
